For 32 years the Fund for the City of New York's Public Service Awards Program has honored outstanding civil servants whose work performance and commitment to the public transcend not merely the ordinary but the extraordinary — day after day and year after year. In honoring these winners, we also acknowledge the contributions of the many thousands of dedicated public servants who, with integrity and devotion, perform the work that keeps this complex city running.

This year's winners, and the 209 winners from previous years, were selected from among more than 250,000 eligible workers in the mayoral agencies, the Transit and Housing Authorities, the Health and Hospitals Corporation, The City University of New York, district attorneys' offices and the public libraries.

Winners come from all levels and ranks of New York City's government.

Sloan Public Service Award Winners demonstrate some or all of the following: extraordinary service delivered with ingenuity, energy and compassion – an expression of commitment far beyond the call of duty; responsiveness to public needs by cutting through red tape or developing more effective methods of service delivery; outstanding and reliable performance both under the pressures of daily routine and in times of crisis; willingness to take risks, if that is what is needed, to improve services or correct abuses or inequities; the ability to adapt to change and provide a continued high standard of service to the public; and upholding the public interest amidst competing interests, pressures and demands.

SANDRA BLOODWORTH

Director, Arts for Transit, Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA)

For 17 years Sandra Bloodworth has been implementing one of the less heralded but more astonishing aspects of the turnaround of New York City's transit system: the return of an aesthetic sensibility to the subways, giving 4.5 million daily riders unexpected encounters with beauty, history and whimsy. An artist herself, Ms. Bloodworth worked with the Mississippi Arts Commission supporting community arts groups there before coming to New York and eventually to the MTA, which had started its Arts for Transit Program about three years earlier. Since 1996 she has directed the program which advocated for restoring precious mosaics and terra cotta pieces created when the subways were first opened 100 years ago, introducing new art, commissioning and displaying posters and photographs in subway stations and operating the "Music Under New York" program, which brings live subway station performances to scores of stations weekly.

In addition to attracting artists and overseeing the work of new art installations — 15 to 20 new projects start annually and about 40 are in progress at any given time; 152 pieces of art in 140 stations have been installed since the program began — she has played a role in many of the system's design elements, from railings and Metrocard vending machines to new subway cars. Working against great odds, with immense fiscal constraints and decades of indifference to maintenance, she has charted a return to the original subway founders' vision of a network ennobled by touches of grace and beauty.

The MTA's NYC Transit subway system contains the largest subway car fleet in the world with 27 interconnected routes and 468 subway stations. Ms. Bloodworth's goal is to have art in every one of them.

JUDY JAMES-HERNANDEZ

Deputy Director for Design Review, Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD)

Judy James-Hernandez moved from her native Jamaica to a cramped New York City apartment when she was 16 years old. Finding her new home confining and illogically and inconveniently laid out, she developed an interest in urban design and architecture that led to undergraduate studies in urban affairs and economics and a graduate degree and a career in architecture, 25 years of which have been in HPD.

HPD is the largest municipal developer of affordable housing in the nation. It is currently carrying out a five-year \$3 billion plan to fund the creation and preservation of 65,000 units. Ms. James-Hernandez has worked in HPD in a neighborhood preservation office in the Bedford Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn; served as a construction manager learning first- hand about the intricacies of completing projects on time and within budget; monitored the rehabilitation of buildings and controlled the cost of doing so and interacted with contractors

on many jobs. She now plays a leadership role in a team that oversees the design and rebuilding of entire blocks of abandoned buildings in some of the city's most depressed areas, particularly Harlem, Melrose in the Bronx and Bushwick. She supervises 15 programs which create new housing ranging from one-family homes to developments with thousands of units.

Tot-lots, off street parking cleverly masked by landscaping, building façade materials that blend harmoniously with neighboring structures and welcoming public lobbies are not required by the codes that govern new construction. Ms. James-Hernandez reaches beyond the minimum requirements of her job when reviewing and discussing with developers their taxpayer-funded housing construction plans. She puts forth convincing arguments for more creative, livable design concepts, always ensuring that tax dollars are spent wisely on sound housing that serves the public well.

SPIRO KATTAN

Supervisor of Mechanics, Vehicle Acquisition and Warranty Division, Department of Sanitation (DOS)

Spiro Kattan came to New York City from Jordan when he was a child. He attended local schools here and earned an Associate Degree in automotive technology from New York City Technical College. He entered city government in 1984 as a vehicle mechanic for the Parks Department, staying there for 12 years. In 1996 he transferred laterally to DOS. A year later he applied for a position as an equipment specification writer and got the job developing technical specifications for new vehicles coming on line. DOS, originally known as the Department of Street Cleaning, is the world's largest, using 5,700 vehicles to perform its collection, street sweeping, recycling, salt and sand spreading, snow removal and related functions.

Mr. Kattan's critical assessment of the performance and repair records of old equipment, identification of areas of needed improvement and careful testing of claims made about new equipment and technology earned the respect and confidence of his superiors. In 2000, as the City faced increasing governmental mandates to improve air quality, Mr. Kattan was asked to head the newly established Alternate Fuels/Clean Air Program. He has become DOS's point person in the highly technical, politically sensitive mission of reducing emissions from DOS' vast fleet and has become an expert, advocate and leader, in his own right, presenting and sharing information with municipalities around the country. DOS's is the first and only city agency to introduce ethanol-mix fuel to some of its fleet; more than 800 vehicles now run on alternate fuels; another 650 are equipped with advanced emission controls. DOS has been in compliance with federal standards since 2004 for its entire diesel fleet. Pilot tests of hybrid vehicles and other new technologies are underway — all under Mr. Kattan's careful watch.

THERESA V. LANDAU

Director, Women, Infants & Children Program (WIC), Morrisania Diagnostic & Treatment Center, Health & Hospitals Corporation (HHC)

For 26 years, dietitian and nutritionist Theresa Landau has been providing an expanding array of nutritional services to expectant and new mothers and their children in the Morrisania section of the Bronx. As the Director of the Morrisania Diagnostic and Treatment Center's WIC program, one of about 50 New York City outposts of the nationwide system that provides nutritional education and financial assistance to low income pregnant women and mothers, Ms. Landau has been a trailblazer, creating innovative programs and helping to establish statewide and regional associations of WIC programs to effect large-scale change. She has been become a forceful advocate, helping to ensure a state budget line dedicated to WIC and more than tripling its state funding.

Ms. Landau has earned national recognition as a hands-on administrator who intervenes on behalf of her most needful charges, connecting them to social services beyond those her program offers and, in emergencies, finding them shelter, emotional support and other necessities. Stories of Ms. Landau's compassion and personal commitment are legion, and have achieved almost legendary status among the WIC community.

Modest, always crediting her dedicated staff of 26 nutritionists, nurses, public health educators, lactation consultants, counselors, outreach workers and support staff and mastering Spanish to be able to communicate with her clients, she has expanded the Program's basic mandate of providing financial assistance, by adding nutritional counseling services, latenight and drop-in hours, a breastfeeding peer counseling program that has become a model for the state, and established satellite offices at a school for pregnant teenagers and at a shelter for homeless persons. Health statistics show her Program's participants and their babies are doing better than comparable non-participants.

JULIUS C. SPIEGEL

Borough Commissioner, Brooklyn, Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR)

Over a 32-year career in New York City government, Julius Spiegel has served with distinction in four agencies in positions ranging from management intern to budget director to productivity improvement project director for the Mayor's Office of Operations. For the last 23 years he has been DPR's Brooklyn Borough Commissioner, directing a spectacular renaissance of Brooklyn's green spaces and recreational offerings. In addition to managing more than 4,700 acres of parkland spread over parks, playgrounds, beaches, and other recreational facilities, his operation also maintains 250,000 street and park trees, and conducts over 1,000 special recreational and cultural events a year. His position was created by the then parks commissioner to improve service delivery, efficiency, accountability and openness to the community. By all accounts Mr. Spiegel has succeeded, in all respects, and more, employing his management skills, knowledge of government operations and respect for and understanding of community needs.

Mr. Spiegel views his job as not merely running smoothly the borough's existing park and recreational facilities, but to constantly seek their improvement. Accomplishments during his tenure include: revitalizing Coney Island as a world-class regional attraction; building the city's first formally designed cricket field for the growing West Indian population in the Gateway Plaza area; renovating Brooklyn's two grand boulevards, Eastern and Ocean Parkways; refurbishing the Brooklyn Heights Promenade; establishing Brooklyn's first skateboard park in Owl's Head Park; organizing an outdoor market in Red Hook to replace an illegal "bazaar" and creating the Salt Marsh Nature Center with 1.25 miles of wetlands trails in Marine Park. Mr. Spiegel has also been a strong advocate for youth and adult sports leagues, which flourish in Brooklyn.

Virtually every community in the borough has been touched by what Mr. Spiegel and his staff have achieved.

ALAN WAGNER

Manager, International Resource Center (IRC), Queens Borough Public Library (QBPL)

The 25-year long career of Alan Wagner at the QBPL, which has the largest circulation of any public library system in the country and 16 million visitors a year, has been marked by sensitivity to the changing needs of the diverse communities and residents of Queens, continuous innovation, a wealth of stellar cultural and community programs, forums for scholarly and international discussions, and a heretofore unmatched collection of resources for global studies and international commerce that are fully accessible to the general public.

Nearly half of the population of Queens has lived in the United States for less than a decade; more than 115 languages are spoken there. Mr. Wagner has reached out to every community he has served, listened to what all the residents need and want and then created programs and found materials to encourage people to come to the public libraries to learn about their neighbors' cultures, and help newcomers find books, videos,

newspapers and classes to manage their lives in their new country and also keep in touch with their homeland.

Building on his first experience as a branch librarian in a community of recent immigrants from Caribbean countries, he later set standards for adult programs for the 63 branch libraries throughout the borough, helped institutionalize the New Americans Program and created, in less than six months time, a vision for IRC, assembled an elite, multilingual staff and stocked its shelves. The IRC holds 55,000 volumes in 50 languages, including many items not found outside academic research facilities. Thanks to Mr. Wagner's skills, imagination, creativity and knowledge, IRC has overcome funding crises and has emerged as a leading provider of cultural, educational, and research resources for immigrants, widely known and respected internationally.
